Array of services help St. Laurent seniors

Seniors looking to relocate or make their homes more secure might want to review a booklet offered free by a St. Laurent organiza-

tion.

Marie Claude Giguère, president and founder of Helping Seniors, an organization that helps seniors and their families with relocation decisions, created the 16-page booklet. It asks key questions such as whether the person wants meals included fin the new residence language of the control of the co dence, laundry done or if a parking space is required. Helping Seniors also helps people who wish to make their homes more secure so that they can remain autonomous longer.

Giguère researches the person's needs,

"She is very very helpful," Arie said. "She picked up Helen and showed her around. She is patient and very good with seniors." Giguère said fees for her services are paid mainly by the seniors' residence when a relo-

cation is involved. Fees for other services are paid by the client. Giguere said she has developed a network of

Objects said she has developed a network of people who work with seniors. Her experience includes five years as a director of activities at two seniors residences, including Le Weilestey Pointe Claire.

The Volunteer Bureau in St. Laurent also provides services for seniors, including drives to medical appointments, Meals on Wheels and help for vision-impaired people to write

and help for vision-impaired people to write cheques and pay bills. It also offers respite for care-givers.

"We want to improve the quality of life for our seniors," said Diane Deguire, the bureau's executive director.

The bureau was founded in 1979 and has 400

volunteers, who work with children as well, including serving meals at schools to after-

school homework programs.

It is offered by the Quebec Housing Association and is available by making an ap-plication through the city of St. Laurent. The

To be eligible, a person must be 65 years or older with an income of no more than \$18,000, or \$22,000 for two people.
